

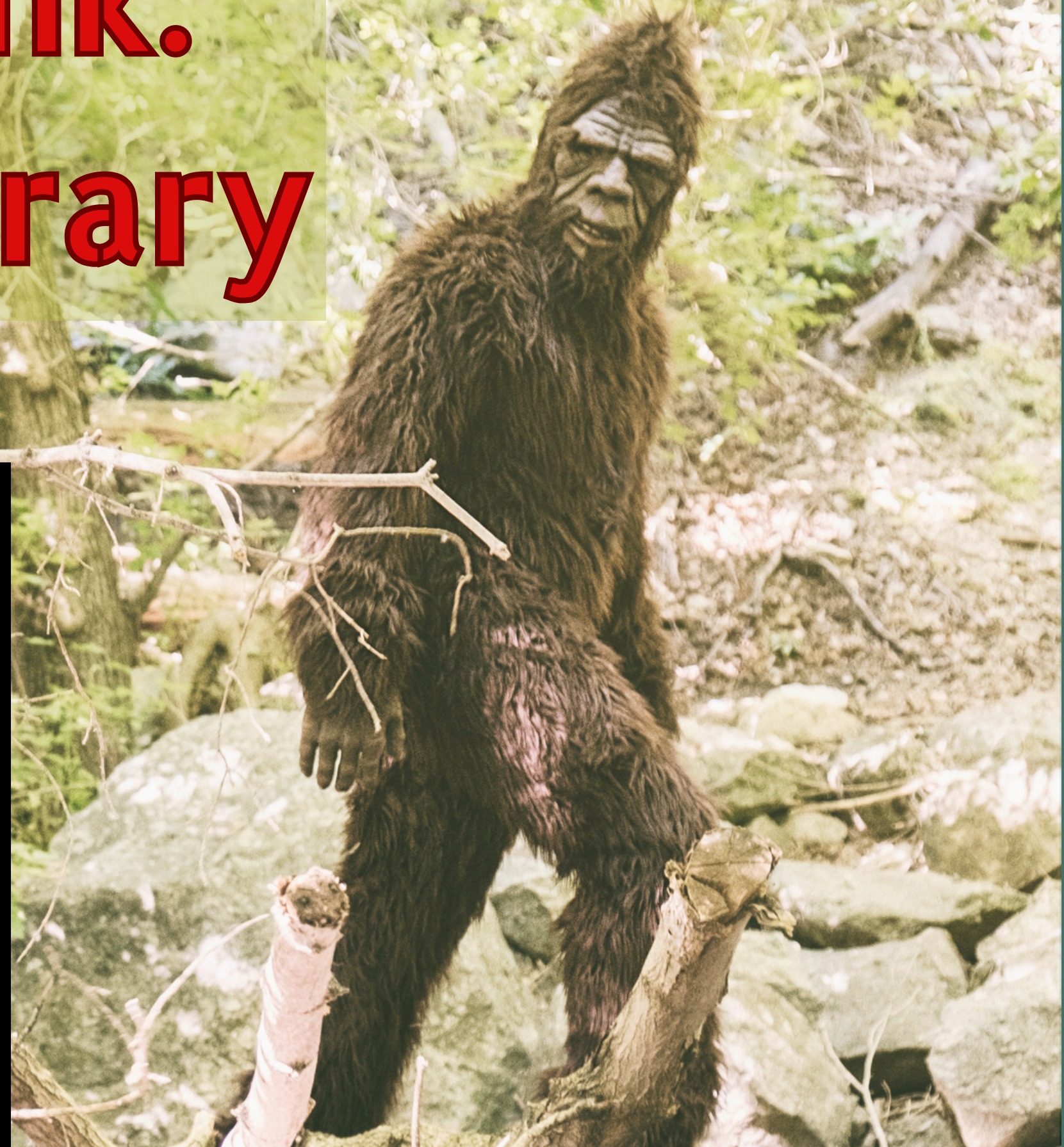

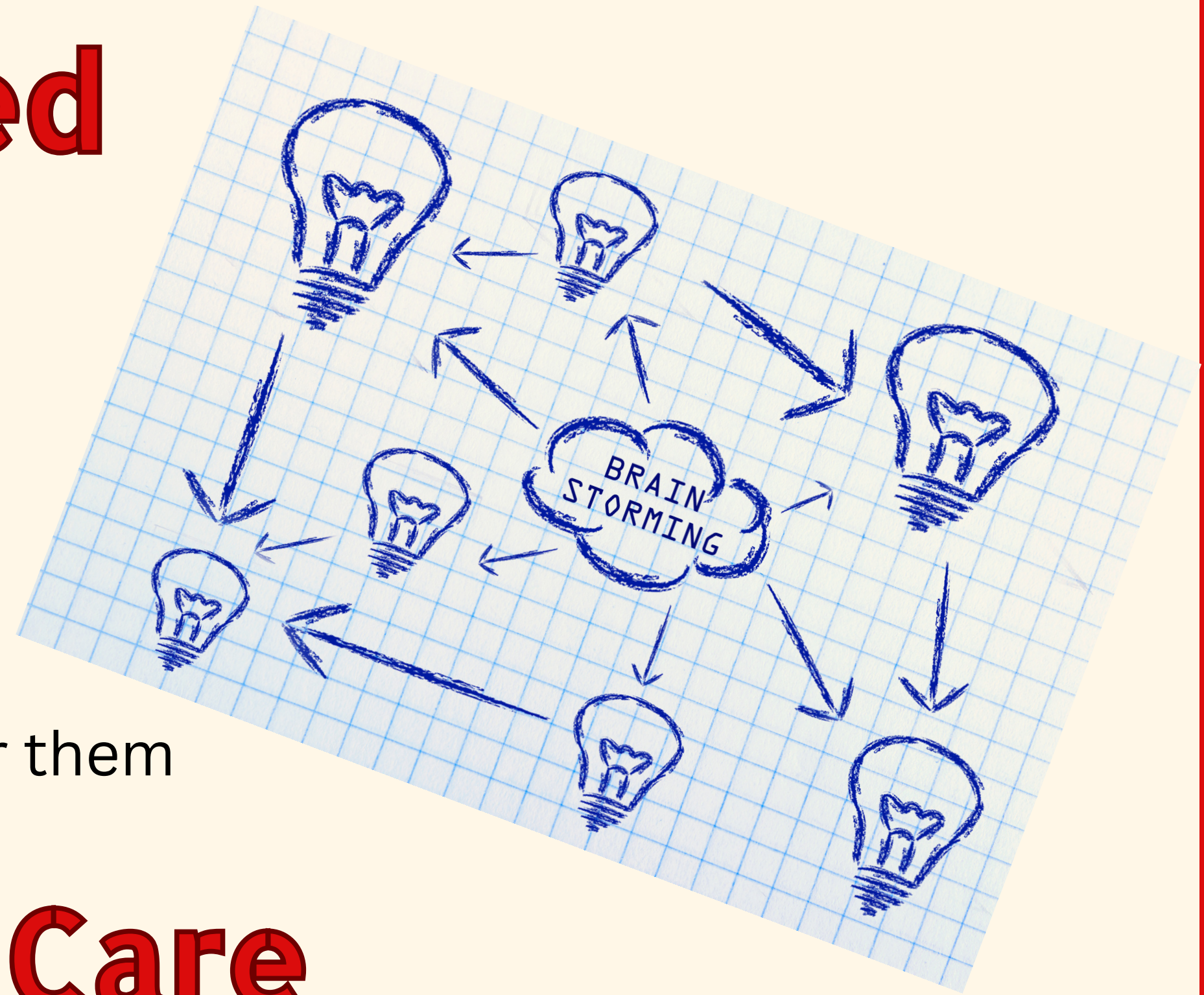

What we perceived

- **Teens come to the library for:**
 - Social time with friends
 - Free internet and computers
 - Safe space (Parent resource)
 - Place to study and collaborate
 - Food
 - A program if it had relevance for them



Why Should We Care

Teens who use the library become adults who use and support the library

“ I remember in elementary the whole class would go there at least once a year but that’s stopped in junior high, so we don’t really hear much about it anymore....kids our age don’t go; they don’t hear about it or they just don’t think about it.”

Survey - What we *ask* them

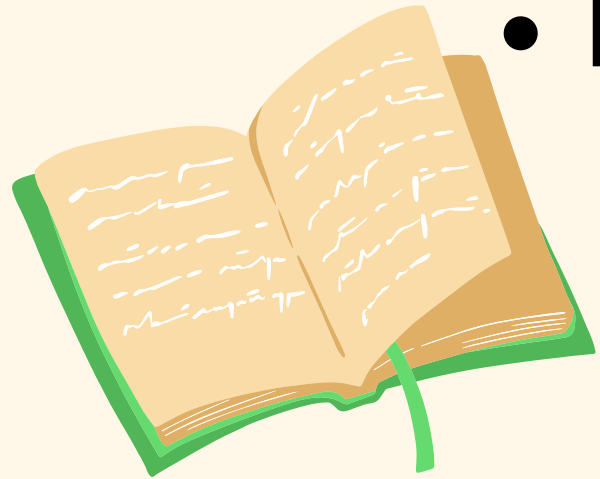


Connect - How we *hear* them

Survey Elements



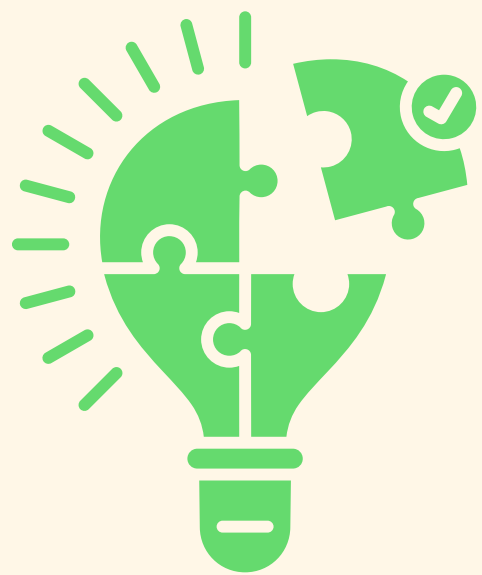
- **Personal Input**

- What influences what they read



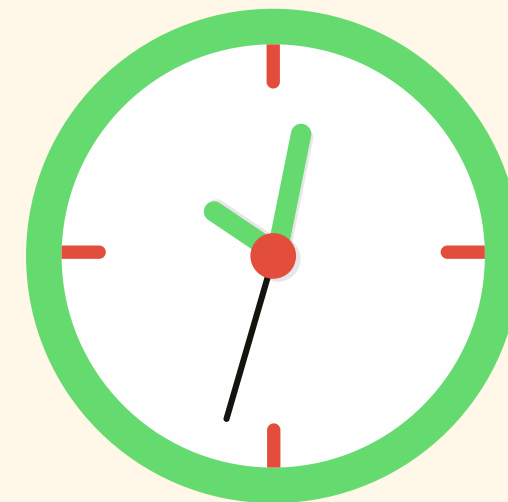
- **At the Library**

Survey Outreach



- School Principals
- Guidance Counselors
- Teachers we've done programs with
 - Teachers we know personally
- Teen Patrons that come into the library
 - YMCA during "no school" days



Survey Results - Personal Input

- Mostly 4th and 6th grade responses - 99 responses
- 12% of the respondents were 7 - 12 grade
- 2/3 considered themselves readers
- 40% know they have a library card; 25% don't know
- How often do you go to the library?
 - 30% - don't
 - 22% - once a week or more



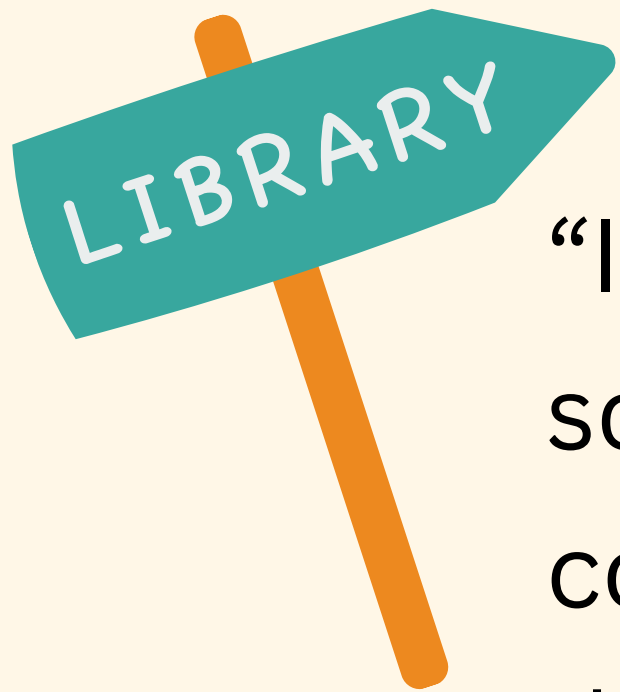
Survey Results - Personal Input

- I read for... (check all that apply)
 - 53% - school assignments
 - 41-44% - pleasure, to learn, other
 - 10% - I don't read
- I choose books by... (check all that apply)
 - 61% - cover
 - 49% - description on back
 - 39% - recommendations from friends



Survey Results - At the Library

- Where do you get reading materials? (check all that apply)
 - 78% - school/classroom libraries
 - 43% - public library
 - 34% - Amazon/book stores



“I don’t like library books because they’re used and dirty sometimes. You don’t know where those books have been. They could have been in someone’s laundry or bathroom or you just don’t want to know.”

Survey Results - At the Library

- I find out about programs...(check all that apply)
 - 30% - word of mouth/parents
 - 28% - library website
 - 27% - not interested in knowing
 - 23% - school announcements; other
 - 15% or less - social media; info around town, within library, tv/radio

(Check all...)
 - 62% - None
 - 27% - Website
 - 19% - Facebook
 - 4% - Instagram
 - 4% - My Libro App

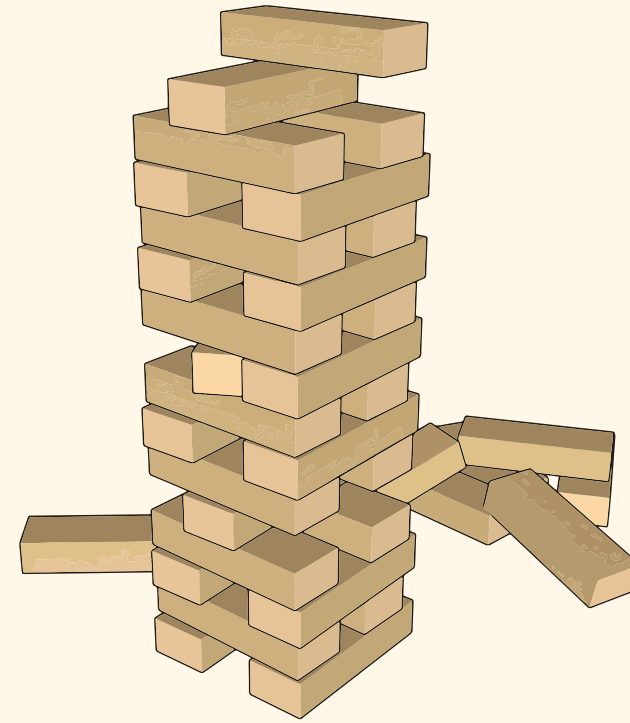


Survey Results - At the Library

- What events that we currently offer are you interested in?

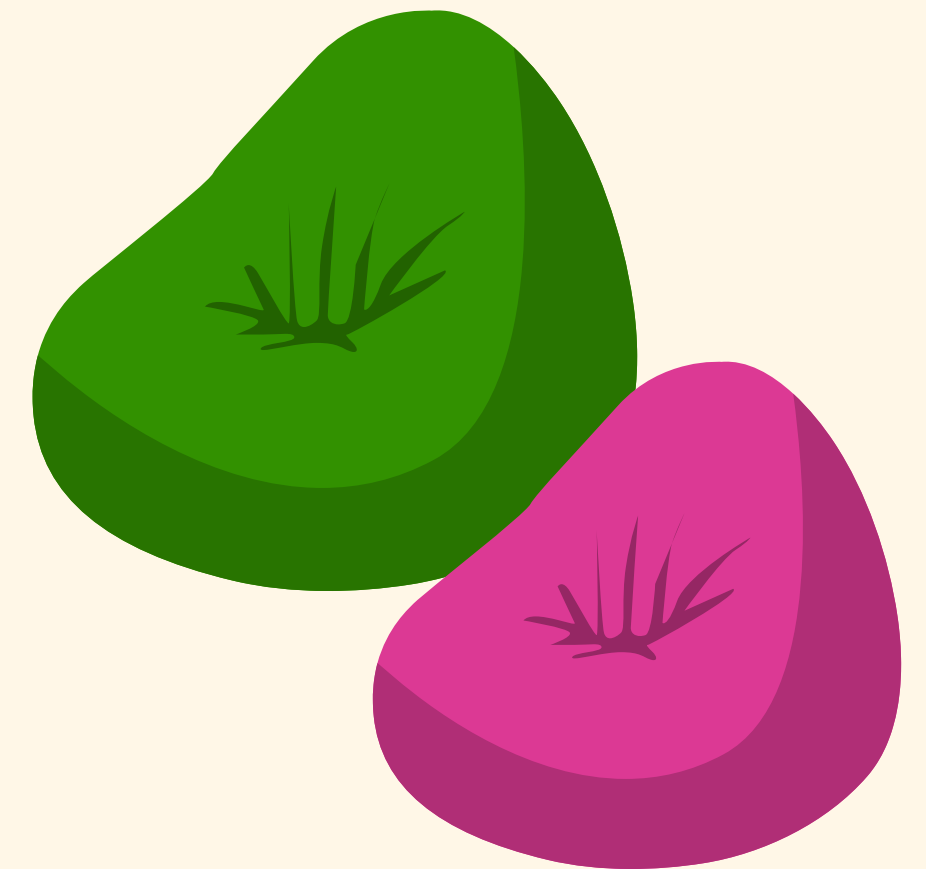
(Check all that apply)

- 47% - Books
- 44% - Games
- 39% - Computer use
- 28% - Puzzles
- 25% - Chess; I'm not familiar with what is offered
- 22% - STEAM cart workshop
- 18% - Summer Reading Program
- 12% - Tween book club



Survey Results - Their Needs

- Do you have a means of coming to the library on “no school” and after school?
 - 55.5% - Yes
 - 44.5% - No
- What do you look for when coming to the public library? (Check all that apply)
 - 58% - Comfortable seating
 - 49% - Place to hang out with friends
 - 48% - Games; quiet private space
 - 44% - Coffee and snacks
 - 41% - Computers
 - 22% - Programs
 - 20% - Separate space away from kids and adults

Understanding Teens' Brains

- Not fully developed - impulsive
- Any correction feels like an attack
- Sense of responsibility is still developing
 - Commitments are short
 - Items get left behind
 - Have to touch EVERYTHING
 - Making sure the magnetic letters don't spell inappropriate words after they leave

 - What are we willing to change



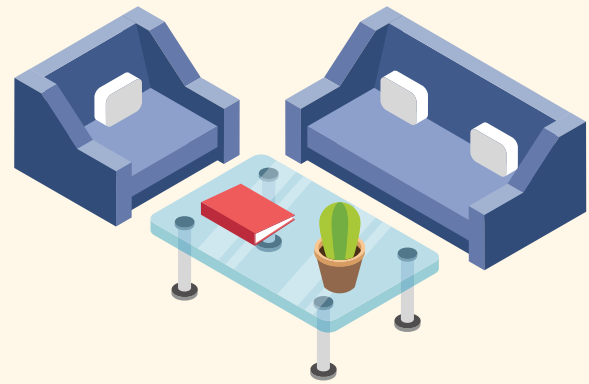

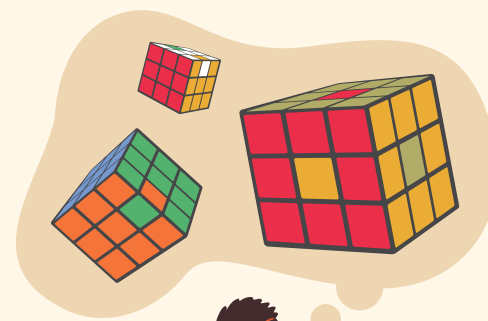
- Not always programs



- Providing a space

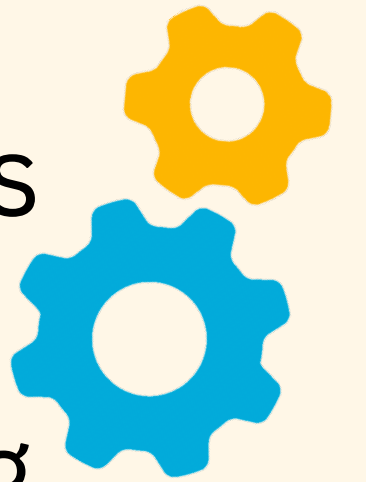

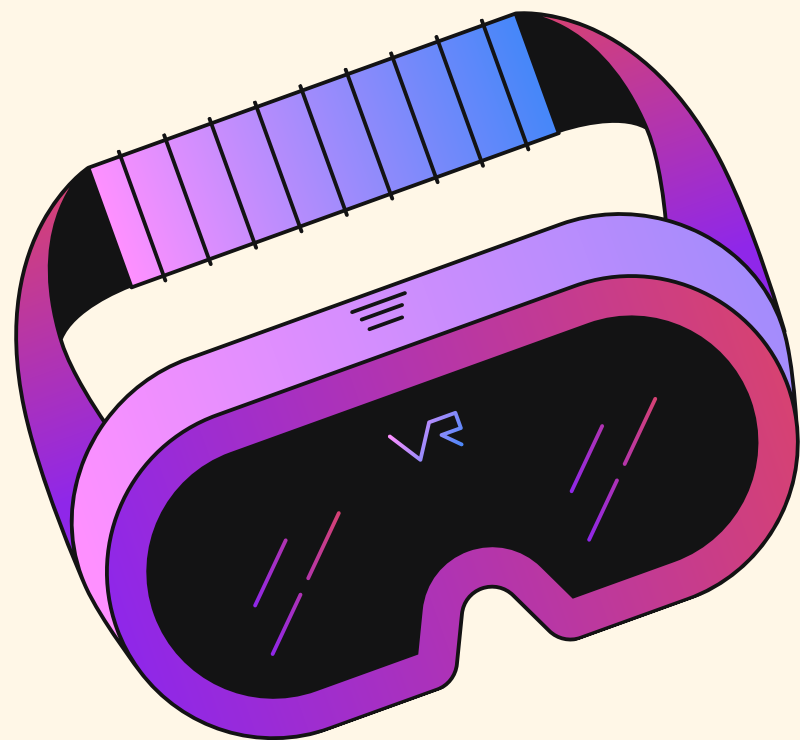

Survey Results: Programming

- Do you think of the library as a place that offers programs for teens/tweens?
 - 89% said yes or maybe
- Other activities survey respondents listed
 - Crafts, sports?, VR, outdoor activities, cooking, movies, bingo, anime/manga, volunteering
