


#### Advantages

- Fall Kick off








TICOS gave me volunteer opportunities and a place to hang out and meet new friends while being involved in the community


TICOS always gave me something to look forward to every week and I got to meet some awesome people because of it, and I mean who wouldn't love waking up early for the flag route!!






